# A flare for odour control

There is no better example of the creep of residential development into industrial precincts than evacuation of residents from around a Melbourne landfill in September 2008 due to dangerously high methane concentrations.

There are more complaints about odour and gaseous emissions than any other industrial activity. While few examples are as graphic as that, urban air pollution has recently resurfaced as an issue for EPAs.

Governments have also ramped up their focus on emissions of greenhouse gases. Much of that currently focuses on process refinements to improve energy efficiency, but there is also talk of end of pipe technologies, such as to separate and capture CO<sub>2</sub>.
